The vision for our curriculum

At Gordano school, we are ambitious for all students to experience, develop and secure the knowledge, skills and attitudes that will allow them to progress with curiosity and confidence through school and beyond. Our definition of the curriculum is 'the entire planned learning experience' (Waters, 2017). Our aim therefore in planning and implementing both the taught and wider curriculum is to develop lifelong learners, with the agency and desire to positively contribute to the various communities to which they belong.

We can however equip students with essential, 'powerful' knowledge across a breadth of subject discipline, along with the skills, attitudes and dispositions that will enable them to apply, adapt and build on this knowledge in the future.

Understanding the Guided Choices



> From Year 9, students will study subjects that will prepare them for a successful future

➤ It's essential that they continue to study a range of different subjects, particularly because students are starting KS4 in Year 9

> It's important that they have some choices

The subjects that students will study in Year 9 - 11 fall into three groups; Core Subjects, Core Choices and Free choice

1. Core Subjects

English, Maths, Science Triple Science will begin in Year 10 Core PE, Ethics

2. Core Choices*

- 1. History or Geography
- 2. French or Spanish
- 3. Creative Choice (from the Creative Arts, DT courses or PE) *For the majority of students.

3. 1 Free choice

- ➤ A second Humanities subject, a second Creative Art or DT, Social Sciences, PE or Computing subject
- Twilight RE (additional subject)
- > This includes vocational choices as well as GCSEs



Why a Creative, a Humanities and a Language?

- ✓ Curriculum variety in terms of subject content and ways of learning
- ✓ A broad view of the world through different and diverse perspectives and cultures
- ✓ Critical thinking
- ✓ Development of memory
- ✓ Improved concentration
- ✓ Self-expression
- ✓ Transferrable skills



- The EBacc is a set of subjects at GCSE that **keeps young people's options open for further study and future careers.** These subjects are considered essential to many degrees and are held in high regard by employers.
- A student will achieve the EBacc if they achieve a **Grade 5 or above in English Language**, **Mathematics**, **2 Sciences**, **a Modern Foreign Language and History or Geography** (6 specific GCSE qualifications in total).
- UCL Institute of Education study showed that studying EBacc subjects provides students with greater opportunities in further education and increases the likelihood that a pupil will stay on in full-time education.
- > Sutton Trust research reveals that studying the EBacc can help improve a young person's performance in English and Maths.
- Most students will follow an EBacc curriculum for these reasons. However we are rightly proud of the achievements of all our subjects and all our students, whether part of the 'EBacc' or not.

Unavailable subject combinations: Art and Textiles, Business and Psychology (if studying the full core curriculum)

 - ✓ To make the most of subjects you'll finish at the end of this year


Know that even if you're continuing with a subject you're not that keen on/confident in, it will be okay! We will support you.


Making Choices
