

The Careers team is looking forward to hosting our next Teatime Networking session this week with Branding and Promotional experts Tomato Source. Highlighting careers within the Creative industries



YEAR 9 GO ECO FOR ART TEXTILES


During remote learning, this term year 9 started a new project based on reduce, reuse & recycle.

The DIY Denim Project has taught students throughout lockdown about the importance of making products last and not to buy into Fast Fashion. Students researched into how the textiles industry has a negative impact on the environment and how they can develop a range of products using recycled materials. They have researched a range of sustainable designers including; Zero Waste Daniel, a New York designer who uses unwanted materials from high end designers, and Wyatt and Jack who create bags and accessories from inflatables.

After creating an array of inspirational mood boards, the group went on to develop a range of practical samples remotely during live lessons. Students have woven using denim from jeans, created embroidery onto denim, learnt how to transfer an image onto fabric using fabric crayons and, since returning, have also fused plastics together to create a new material for decoration. We have seen some excellent examples of work which will now be developed into design concepts ready to make in the coming weeks. The students did fantastically during this time and showed real motivation to produce top quality work. Well done to the year 9 group.

The textiles team is still keen to receive <u>unwanted denim</u>. If you have any denim you may be thinking of sending to charity shops, please send it our way to facilitate projects like this. We are after jeans, jackets or shirts. To remain **Covid-19 safe**, we request the items are washed prior to dropping in at main reception in a bag. We will quarantine items for a week before preparing them for students' projects.

GORDANO STUDENTS EXCEL IN THE BRITISH PHYSICS OLYMPIAD


Gordano students have reaped success in the 2021 British Physics Olympiad. Nine students took part in the Intermediate Challenge, joining 4700 other year 11 students from 200 schools located across the UK and overseas.

The BPhO is not an exam and was completed by students seeking a physics challenge and an opportunity to take part in this prestigious national competition organised by Oxford University, Cambridge University, the IET and a host of industrial partners.

The BPhO is extremely challenging but all participating Gordano students were awarded certification having completed the challenge online. In total, the physics students obtained 1 gold, 6 silvers and 2 bronze awards. Well done to all those who took part and a very successful haul!









LIBRARY ACCESS


The Library is open at Break and Lunch to all year groups with the following guidelines

To borrow books, bring them to the Library desk. You can still request books on Click & Collect via FireFly.


