


A brilliant and original new tale from a unique writer who likes to take his readers on thrilling adventures that also make them think . (II+)

But this is just the beginning, and what starts out as a run of bad luck starts to feel like a curse. As Bitsy's life goes from bad to worse, things only get better and better for her best friend. It's as if there's only so much luck to go round and Amy's getting all of it...

Magic doesn't exist in the broken city of Lkossa anymore, especially for girls like sixteen-yearold Koffi. Indentured to the notorious Night Zoo, she cares for its fearsome mythical creatures to pay off her family's debts. But when they are threatened by the Zoo's cruel master, Koffi unleashes a power she doesn't fully understand. As the son of a decorated hero, Ekon destined to become an elite warrior. Until a fire at the Night Zoo upends his future and, on the brink of his final rite of passage, Ekon is cast out - his reputation left in tatters. For Koffi and Ekon, the outlook is bleak - unless they can capture the Shetani, the vicious monster that plagues their city.

When two strangers meet at a party and realise they both feel different from everyone else there, they start the The Sad Ghost Club - a secret society for the anxious and alone, a club for people who think they don't belong. Author Spotlight: Sue Wallman



Sue Wallman is an author of thrillers for teens (12+), a genre that has been very popular with students lately. She has recorded a virtual visit for Year 9 for World Book Day and agreed to answer a few questions for us.



How did you start writing and what made you write this genre particularly?

I've always loved reading and writing. I worked with words as a magazine journalist for many years but writing fiction is different and it took me a long time to get a book deal. My main problem was that I didn't have enough happening in my plots, and it was only when I tried writing thrillers that things came together for me. With thrillers, I'm forced to have more plot, and it's enjoyable writing about slippery characters!

Your books all have amazing covers. Do you get a say in what they look like, and do you have a favourite?







I'm glad you think so! I don't have as big a say in my covers as you might think. Sometimes things get put on the cover that I didn't have in the story and I'm someone who thinks a narrative link is important so I write them in. For example, in *Your Turn to Die* there are woods on the cover which weren't in the original manuscript. I decided to set the last scene in some woods and it actually improved the story because it made it more creepy. I think my favourite cover is the one for *Lying About Last Summer*, partly because it was my first. I was sent it via email which I received when I was on a train and I gasped when I saw it. It was such an exciting moment. When I saw it in real life, I realised it had "spot varnish" - raised bits to make the swimming pool water more realistic - and I thought that was a great touch.

You have a new book coming out in May, can you tell us a bit more about it?

Such a Good Liar is about a girl who assumes someone else's identity and arrives on an exclusive island looking for revenge.



I loved *Every Line of You* by Naomi Gibson last year. I've just finished an advance copy of Tracy Darnton's *Ready or Not* (out in May) which has a gloriously uneasy vibe to it. My students (I'm also a school librarian) really rate *Ace of Spades* by Faridah Abike-lyimide and I can't wait to read that.
